Riding down with Jackie Greenway and Shelie Murphy Friday was a fun time and a great opportunity to bond. Once we got there and settled, I attended the Funding and Budget breakout ran by Rhonda Nebgen (Past Director) and Angela Taylor (Current Region Director). We discussed how the region budget has been rather tight and how we at the chapter level can help. Participating more in national events, sponsoring ads and tables can help supplement regional expenses. The conversation then turned to chapter participation in the region fund. Apparently, not all chapters have been sending their \$5/member checks every year because of issues receiving the invoice or inability to pay. We spent the remainder of the time discussing why that is and how we can maybe change it moving forward.

When time was up, Jackie, Jessica, and I visited the merch tables where I picked up a nice portfolio, and then walked over to the Be Pro Be Proud truck before the 1st timers meeting. It was really cool to see the different demonstration items they had and talk with one of the representatives about their program. Hopefully we can get a couple of their trucks in the DFW area soon and have them come to some of our events! Jackie also did the 18 wheeler driving simulation which was really interesting. It provided the same real world resistance with getting up to speed, changing direction, and increased stopping time that comes with hauling those giant trailers. There was even settings to turn on weather and show the effects of fatigue. The simulation ended when Jackie "hit" a dog that ran out into the street because there wasn't enough time to stop even though she slammed on the breaks. We all gained more respect for truckers after that.

At the 1st timer's meeting, we talked about the importance of attending these conference and the lasting friendships that can be made. As a 1st timer myself, it was really inspiring to hear from the more 'seasoned' members about their own experiences. Each of us was paired up, I got Stephanie Garcia from the San Antonio area. We didn't get a chance to speak a whole lot since we all needed to get changed for the festival, but first impression: Stephanie was really fun and vibrant and I hope to remain in contact with her! The Fall Festival was an absolute blast! All of us dressed as cows, me a sheep, and Karen, Jessica, and Holly as our ranchers had everyone in the hotel wanting to get pictures with us. Representing the Fort Worth Stockyards and getting into 'character' was awesome, even if my costume was a tad on the extra warm side. The group performing live music, Kordsmeier Music, was phenomenal, I follow them on YouTube now and highly recommend to anyone who enjoys talented singers and musicians!

Day two was the General Session ran by Angela. We had an inspiring inspiration talk from Ronny Walker- the bubbliest person I've ever met in person, the local Boy Scout Troop brought in the US flag, and a couple of students from the Arkansas School of the Deaf gave a very moving performance of the National Anthem in ASL. After the main business of going over attendance and voting to adopt agendas and budgets, we talked about potential changes to be made in our region voting bylaws to make it a vote based on plurality instead of by majority where if more than 2 people run for a position they would only need the most votes and not 50% or more of the total vote. This would hopefully avoid multiple runoff elections and encourage more members to run for regional level positions. We had a great discussion



about the pros and cons to the point where I feel like everyone in the room had been provided enough information to be on one side or the other.

Our Keynote Speaker, Candice Lawrence from the AR State Chamber, gave us a really good presentation on her personal journey going from Caterpillar to working in local government, some of the struggles we face as women in a male dominated industry, and how we can start to overcome our worst critics- our pocket jury. A lot of us suffer from the "curse of competence," or becoming the "go-to" person for many more tasks than what is in our job description because of how effectively we accomplish those tasks, which isn't necessarily a bad thing as long as it doesn't lead to burn out down the road. Getting better at saying no and managing the amount of access we give to others to ask for these extra things would go a long way to prevent that burn out. We also need to remember that "old keys cannot open new doors," meaning that the skills we develop should always be growing and changing to adapt to an environment that is doing the same.

The pocket jury concept was something that I think we had all experienced, but hadn't had it explained or identified by anyone else. Those little voices you hear at the back of your mind whenever you make a mistake or try to start or do something new and unfamiliar that are always discouraging and make us hesitate, that's your pocket jury. Being able to recognize them when they pop up without warning helps you gain control back by adding your own more "friendly" members to point out the positives about the situation and the silver linings from whatever past mistakes or bad choices that are being pushed to the forefront of your memory.

After we came back from lunch, we had a really great panel on safety in our line of work, including the most important, but not often talked about, Psychological Safety. If you are in an environment where you do not feel included; safe to ask questions so you can learn; safe to contribute or voice your ideas; or safe to challenge the status quo without fear of being embarrassed, marginalized, or punished in some way; find a way to talk to someone you trust-like the HR representative, to help start the conversation to make the changes necessary to make sure you can feel all those things! No one should have to accept a poor quality of life, ever!

At the close of our meeting, Angela gave an extremely moving talk about losing her mother and the book she's writing as a part of her mourning process. Every time she used to call her mother, she would start the conversation by saying, "Hey mom..." Now, all she has to do is look up and say it, and she's telling her mom about all the good things and the bad things going on in her life. She gave us some examples of the things she would say, and by the end of it, I'm pretty sure we were all crying. It was beautiful.

All in all, I had a wonderful time and can't wait until the next one !!!

For once, I arrived on Thursday night and had the opportunity to participate in the Friday events. We started the morning off with a strategy session for the chapter presidents and region committee chairs. Some great discussion was had and lots of ideas shared.

After the strategy meeting and lunch, a group of us decided to go to the Be Pro, Be Proud truck. This initiative was started by the Arkansas State Chamber of Commerce and the Associated Industries of Arkansas. The trucks feature several simulators including an 18-wheel drive truck, a train, a welder and an excavator. The trucks primarily visit schools throughout the state to introduce and give students a hand's on look at skilled trade professions. To date, the initiative has expanded to Georgia, New Mexico, North Carolina, South Carolina and Tennessee. The really exciting news is that Texas is in the process of joining the initiative with two trucks that will travel throughout our state.

Later in the afternoon, several Fort Worth seasoned members attended the First Timers' meeting. We were paired up with a first timer to be a contact and mentor. We had 27 first timers attend!

Next, it was time (and a scramble) to get ready for the Fall Festival and costume contest. To say the least, the Fort Worth Herd was a huge success. We won the most entertaining group contest. We all laughed so hard and, of course, mooed a little, too.

The general session began with the Inspiration, Pledge of Allegiance and NAWIC Pledge by Ronny Walker. If you have never met Ronny, make it a point to at the next regional conference! The National Anthem was led by the Arkansas School for the Deaf. I don't think there was a dry eye in the room; it was so moving. This was followed by introductions, recognitions, welcome speeches and the adoption of the conference rules and agenda.

Kelly Aust, National President-Elect presented President Karen Hager's report followed by Director Angela Taylor's report and the Pre- and Post-Con Summaries of Action. Several region committee chairs spoke about the committee goals for the year.

Our keynote speaker was Candice Lawrence, Vice President of Programs & Partnerships of the Arkansas State Chamber of Commerce/AIA. Her presentation was entertaining, as well as very motivational. She spoke about her motivation for a HUGE life change and taking chances in her career. She left us with a challenge to "be brave enough to be bad at something new". I have things I want to do in my life, but hold back out of fear; fear of rejection, failure, and maybe even success. Candice's words have made me think more about those goals and where I want to start being more brave.

We broke for lunch and reconvened by finishing up with committee reports. We were way ahead of schedule, so we moved right into the afternoon speaker's panel on Psychological Safety. This was a new term for me, but means feeling safe to voice our opinions, point out issues, and take risks without fear of negative consequences. It was interesting to hear from the ladies on the panel on different issues and examples they had encountered.

The last of the afternoon included some final business reports, adopting the Region Fund Budget and adopting the SOX policies for the region. Lastly, invitations for Forum 2024 (Corpus Christi), Annual Conference 2024 (Houston) and Fall Conference 2024 (Tulsa) were given. I have to say, Tulsa knocked it out of the park with a tribute to Jimmy Buffet in the form of a song about Tulsa NAWICville! Watch the video if you see in on Facebook.

Weatherford Report on NAWIC SCR Fall Conference 2023 – Little Rock, AR

Fort Worth Chapter #1 had a great and entertaining showing at the NAWIC SCR Fall Conference 2023 held in Little Rock, AR on October 13th and 14th. The "Cowtown Herd" won the "Most Entertaining" in costume contest category. Holly Green received special recognition of her Bull Rider costume, and she had the personality to match keeping both hotel guest and NAWIC members in stitches all night.

I participated in the President and Committee Chair meeting in President Megan Shaw's absence to learn the strategic direction that Director Angela Taylor envisions for region in the coming year. The key theme across all the chapters in attendance was "Change the Narrative". Everyone is looking to increase participation by members – new and tenured, attracting new members across the industry and making a difference in our communities. We also talked about WIC Week for 2024. Some key ideas included using the trade papers and issue press releases about our plans and activities, make sure you include a "build" component event, to count everyone that attends an event – not just members but also guests (of any gender) and to cross-pollinate with other Construction related organizations. This resonates the same strategic plan that President Shaw presented in August to the Fort Worth Board and Committee Chairs. Nicole Bolton, Regional Marketing Chair provided each chapter with a copy of "Blueprint for Success – NAWIC Celebrates its First 50 years".

On Friday, Shelie Murphy, Lori Donnell and I traversed the city of Arkansas to the "Be Pro Proud – Interactive Construction Experience". This was a demonstration trailer that is used to promote construction and trades careers. We were able to simulate driving a semi-truck, operate a train engineer and operate an excavator. The experience taught me to be more cognizant of the time it takes to stop a big rig or train is a long longer and harder than in a passenger vehicle or truck. There were also stations that focused on 3D printing, etching and robotic handling of material. Following this returned to the hotel via the Vogel Sculpture Garden. Next, we attended the "first timer's" meeting. In this meeting, the first timers were paired with a tenured member as a mentor. We were able to exchange information and provide them with a contact to help them in their NAWIC journey. Following this the attendees participated in the Fall Festival which is where the costume contest mentioned above was held. It was a great time of networking with fellow chapters and attendees.

In keeping with the theme of Changing the Narrative, we started the day on Saturday with an inspirational message from Tulsa Chapter member Ronny Walker. She says her faith is what drives her and gets her through the good times as well as the bad and drew her to NAWIC. She gave us all a positive message to carry through the day and the year. We then moved through the business of who was in attendance and there were 88 voting members, with 3 chapters not having a representative present. The total attendance count was 94 including voting members, guests, National Board representatives and out-of-region attendees.

The keynote speaker was Candice Lawrence, a member of the Arkansas State Chamber. She talked out how we all have "pocket jury's" that show up when we are outside of our comfort zone. These pocket juries can be Judge Janet (judging every thought and action), a cautious Carl (who is afraid of risks), Librarian Libby (who keep tracks of your wins and losses) and the alternate juror, Sassy that keeps tracks of all the wins. We need to control who is in our pocket jury and for how long, striving to have a more positive outlook. This was a very entertaining and insightful presentation.



We heard from Kelly Aust, National President-Elect. She gave us an update from the National Board highlighting activities since Annual Conference. The biggest change we are seeing is the new website that we are still having some technical issues with. Director Taylor reported on changes from National and the Region, most notably was that Memphis has now moved to the South-Atlantic Region with all of the other Tennessee chapters. Also it was relayed that the election of 2 additional Director's to the National Board was defeated (these were to be National Committee Chair Directors that would be a pathway to the Executive leadership roles of the National Board (meaning Pres, Pres-Electe, VP, Secretary and/or Treasurer).

Following lunch, we had an Ally Networking event. This broke us up into groups of GCs, Subcontractors/Suppliers and Accessory Services businesses. We were then challenged to network and share contact info with 3 attendees that we had not previously met. LinkedIn played a focal point in sharing information.

Chapter President and Regional Committee reports are in the electronic program if you would like to read them, but we heard from a few of the Committee chairs in person. Leading the way was Lori Donnell, Regional Membership Chair. The theme this year is "Old Keys Won't Open New Doors". There are several opportunities for awards. The goal is to increase and retain membership. Lix Carraway talked about PD&E, pushing for cross-collaboration. Andrea Giron gave the update from Adama Ba, Regional DE&I chair, encouraging all chapters to embrace the concepts and Be Brave. Sandy Field from Houston gave the NEF update that they raised over \$10K in 2023 to support the NEF programs. Riki Lovejoy, San Antonio, gave an updated on the NAWIC Founders Scholarship Foundation. They awarded over 110 scholarships to the tune of over \$184K. We need to be promoting these scholarships funds as they have money to give to promote the industry.

One of my favorite parts was the panel discussion on "Psychological Safety and Empowerment". This focused on the feeling of being safe to learn, safe to contribute and safe to challenge. This impacts everyone, from the office workers, the executives, the field personnel, the interns, the safety officials and to our membership and guests. It makes you stand back and evaluate how you react, communicate and reason in everything that you do, including your family.

IN the final session we adopted the region fund policies as presented in recent emails, we adopted the SOX policies as well as the Region Fund Audit Report (from Dena Rowland).

Lastly, we confirmed that Forum 2024 swill be in Corpus Christi, April 12-13- the theme is "All Aboard", Annual Conference will be in Houston, August 14-17 and lastly that Fall Conference 2024 will be in Tulsa with the "Tulsa-ritaville" members. Spring Forum 2025 was tabled as it may turn into a joint Southern region conference.


