Forum 2024 Report Corpus Christi, TX Submitted by Lori Donnell

On Friday, I attended the Personal Safety and Awareness session presented by the Corpus Christi Police Department. I learned a lot about both home and vehicle safety. Most of the information was common sense, but things a lot of people do. For example, many people will pull into their garage and shut the garage door, but then leave the door from the garage to the house unlocked. This door should always be locked as a second barrier to thieves. As far as vehicles go, of course, don't leave a key fob in the car. I know, sounds crazy, but they have had multiple car theft reports where that is exactly what happened. In one case, the spouses spare key fob was also left in the car opening up that car to theft as well. Also, don't leave your garage door opener in the car. CCPD arrested one theft ring and one of the thieves had a backpack FULL of garage door openers with the address written on the back. Had they not been arrested, all those homes would have been open to invasion. Finally, don't leave anything with personal information in the car, including insurance cards. Texas is one of at least 27 states that accept digital insurance cards by state troopers as well as local police departments.

The second session I attended was about Color Theory and Mental Wellness. This was very interesting and explained a lot about why we all like certain colors. Colors not only reflect our mood, but can also affect our physical and mental health. For example, red increases blood pressure and can cause stress. In my case, red energizes me and makes me more alert. Colors can also make different people feels differently. A friend that was with me said black is depressing, but another member has predominantly black in her home because it is relaxing to her.

Heat Exhaustion



Title: Staying Safe from Heat Exhaustion at Work: A Guide for Construction Workers

Introduction: When it gets hot outside, people who work outdoors, like construction workers, can get sick from the heat. One big worry is heat exhaustion, which can be really bad for workers' health and safety. Addressing Heat Exhaustion Risks: To stop heat exhaustion at construction sites, everyone needs to do their part:

- 1. Drink Water: Bosses should make sure there's plenty of water around and remind workers to drink it often, even if they don't feel thirsty.
- 2. Find Shade: Workers should take breaks in shaded areas to cool down.
- 3. Plan Work Better: Try to do tough jobs when it's not so hot, like in the morning or evening. If it's super-hot, bosses should think about giving workers lighter tasks or more breaks.
- 4. Wear the Right Gear: Safety gear is important, but it should be light and let air through to keep workers cool.
- 5. Learn About Heat: Everyone should know the signs of heat exhaustion and what to do if someone gets sick. Training can help with this.
- 6. Keep an Eye on the Weather: Check the forecast and change plans if it's going to be really hot.
- 7. Have a Safety Plan: Bosses should make a plan for how to deal with heat and make sure everyone knows it. This can include things like what to do if someone gets too hot.

Conclusion: Heat exhaustion is a big worry for construction workers, especially when it's hot outside. But by being careful and following these tips, bosses and workers can make sure everyone stays safe. Drinking water, taking breaks in the shade, wearing the right gear, and planning work smartly can all help stop heat exhaustion and keep construction sites safe places to work, even when it's hot.


